PURPOSE OF PLAN

DRAFT Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness

- Understand the needs of individuals and families experiencing homelessness in Waco.
- Identify, develop and improve homeless services and partnerships.
- Work collaboratively with services providers to maximize resources.
- Assess the homeless system's current efforts to address homeless ness and provide recommendations to ensure resources are distributed to ensure impact within the community.



WHAT IS HOMELESSNESS?

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HOMELESSNESS is an individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, which includes a primary nighttime residence of:

- Place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation (including car, park, abandoned building, bus/train station, airport, or camping ground),
- Publicly or privately operated shelter or transitional housing, including a hotel or motel paid for by government or charitable organizations,
- Individual or family is being evicted within 14 days from their primary nighttime residence, or
- Is fleeing, or is attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, human trafficking or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence; has no other residence; and lacks the resources or support networks to obtain other permanent housing.



HOMELESS IN YEARS PAST

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Resolution passed by Waco City Council authorizing City Manager to endorse a 10-Year planning process to end chronic homelessness. (May 2004)


City Council approved the creation of a homeless steering committee. (January 2005)

Steering Committee dissolved on August 5, 2014.



HOMELESSNESS IN WACO TODAY


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- 143 persons experiencing homelessness in Waco in 2021.
- 186 unsheltered persons over the past three years.
- 384 sheltered persons over the past three years.
- 41% decrease in unsheltered persons from 2019-2021.
- 18% decrease in sheltered from 2019-2021.


HOMELESSNESS IN WACO

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HOMELESSNESS IN WACO

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2019-2021 Unsheltered Population

204 persons sleeping on the street, benches, parks and vehicles.

- 22 (11%) were chronically homeless
- 184 (89%) were individuals

2019-2021 Sheltered Population

256 persons staying at shelters.

- 185 (72%) were individuals
- 68 (27%) were households
- 2 (1%) were youth
- 7 (3%) chronically homeless






Race and Ethnicity of HoH and Adults

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- Permanent Supportive Housing for clients not affiliated with specific organizations.
- Housing Focused Street Outreach Teams.
- Emergency Shelter for Family Homelessness.
- Long Term Rapid Rehousing Programs.
- Homeless Management Information System Staff Shortage.
- Need for Stronger Collaborations.

Realigning the Continuum of Care

Realigning Core Continuum of Care Functions:

- ☐ Realign core function within the City's structures
- ☐ Assess the need for additional Staff for the CoC and HMIS via internships

CoC Staff Needed:

- CoC System Administrator (existing)
- CoC Monitor/Trainer (Intern)

HMIS Staff Needed:

- HMIS Administrator (existing staff)
- Data Analyst/Trainer (Intern)

Develop A Homeless Response System

A Homeless Response System coordinates all agencies and supportive services that serve the homeless to ensure homelessness is rare, brief and nonrecurring.

Agencies within the Homeless Response System are Housing First focused and funded by a variety of funding sources.



Diversion and Prevention Program

Strategies to Prevent Homelessness Include:

- Increasing Flexible Assistance to Securing Housing (FLASH) funding to support individuals and families when there are no other resources available
- ☐ Developing education and training programs to assist with increasing outcomes
- ☐ Partnership between emergency shelters and rapid rehousing projects to decrease the length of stay in homelessness

- ☐ A decrease in the number of households entering homelessness
- ☐ The length of time a household is spent homeless
- ☐ Jobs and income growth
- ☐ A decrease in the number of households who become homeless for the first time

Homeless Street Outreach Teams

Strategies to Improve and Develop Street Outreach Teams Include:

- ☐ Identify and coordinate with all street outreach teams within the homeless response system to ensure daily case management
- ☐ Increase the number of street outreach teams that are housing-focused
- ☐ Partner with emergency shelters to safely relocate households from places not meant for habitation to emergency shelters or housing
- ☐ Develop a housing-focused program that focuses on identifying permanent housing solutions for unsheltered households

- ☐ A decrease in the number of unsheltered households in encampments
- ☐ Housing for those who are hard to reach or less likely to engage in services

Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing

Strategies to Increase Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing (TH) are:						
 Increase funding for development and operations of an emergency shelter for families Develop transitional housing for families experiencing homelessness who need more than 30 days of 						
shelter Develop transitional housing programs that will assist clients with returning to the path of self-						
sufficiency quickly						
Develop TH-RRH (Transitional Housing to Rapid Rehousing) programs for families and individuals who do not need the full 24 months of transitional housing						
Outcomes Includes						

- ☐ A decrease in the number of children and families unsheltered
- ☐ A decrease in the length of time a family is/remains homeless
- ☐ A decrease in the number of returns to homelessness after being housed
- ☐ An increase in successful housing placements.

Rapid Rehousing

Strategies to Increase Rapid Rehousing Projects in the Homeless Response System Include:

- Evaluating and redeveloping current Rapid Rehousing projects based on the current needs of homeless households
- ☐ Developing more Rapid Rehousing projects as needed for subpopulations, such as youth and Veterans

- ☐ Decrease in time households remain homeless
- Decrease in the number of homeless households
- ☐ Decrease in the number of returns to homeless.
- ☐ Successful housing placements

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

Strategies to Increase Permanent Supportive Housing:

- ☐ Increase funding through the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) application
- ☐ Evaluate current households enrolled in PSH programs to relocate households to permanent housing.
- ☐ Identify mainstream agencies to house chronically homeless households

- ☐ PSH is provided to the most vulnerable
- ☐ Decrease in the number of returns to homeless
- ☐ Successful housing placement+

Move On Program

Strategies to Developing a "Move On" Program:

- ☐ Identify the number of housing vouchers needed
- ☐ Establish partnership with local housing authorities for vouchers
- ☐ Develop policies and procedures for program implementation

- ☐ Decrease number in returns to homelessness
- ☐ Increase in the number of housed with PSH
- ☐ Increase in exits to permanent housing and successful housing placements

☐ Decrease in returns to homeless							




